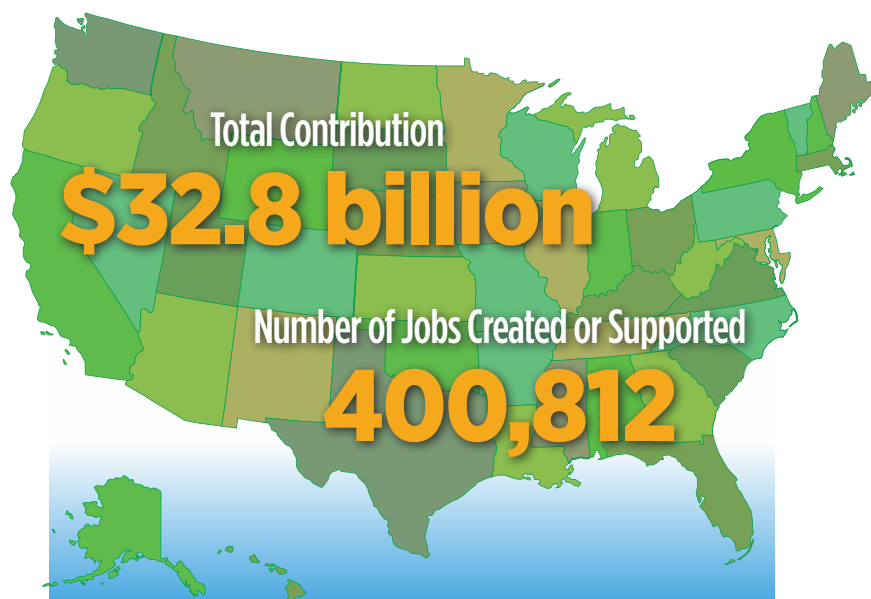

Benefits from International Students



International students studying at U.S. colleges and universities contribute **\$32.8 billion** to the U.S. economy and support **400,812 jobs***.

For every seven international students enrolled, three U.S. jobs are created

and supported by spending occurring in the higher education, accommodation, dining, retail, transportation, telecommunications and health insurance sectors.
