My site visit to Italy with my six-month old daughter, Emily, changed all that. She wasn't supposed to come with me, but due to unforeseen circumstances I had no other choice, so there I was on an official visit with an infant in tow. I was so embarrassed to have to explain this to my partners; I was so sorry for the inconvenience that I had caused, and worried about what I would do for childcare. They, on the other hand, were delighted! Emily came to all of the meetings, and university staff members happily volunteered to take care of the "bambina" while I was in session. We would have our breaks around her feedings and diaper changes, and at lunch and dinner meetings my partners would hold her so that I could eat my meal!

My "accidental" adventure with my daughter gave me a greater insight and appreciation of Italian culture than all my previous exposure combined. Now, if I ever feel that familiar sense of frustration, I think about my trip and wonder why we cannot be more like them.
