Geography

- Asia is the largest continent by landmass and human population
- Asia is home to the highest (Mount Everest) and lowest Dead Sea points on Earth
- The Asian countries are divided broadly into South Asia, North Asia, East Asia and West Asian Regions

Population

- Asia has a population of over 4 billion people or more than 60% of the world's population.
- More than half of Asia's population is in two countries in Asia – China (1.3 billion) and India (1.1 billion).
- Asia has more people than any other continent. In fact, 2 out of every 3 people on Earth live in Asia.



Language

- The Asian continent has the largest of amount of "living languages" spoken.
- Three out of the top five languages of the world are Asian languages.
 - Chinese (macrolanguage)
 - Arabic (macrolanguage)
 - Hindi



Economy

- According to the IMF's 2009 gross domestic product report, two of the top four economies in the world are Asian.
- Asia has nearly doubled its contribution to the "world's richest" list.



China

- China is often considered the longest continuous civilization, dating back to 6000 B.C. It also has the world's longest continuously used written language
- One in every five people in the world is Chinese.
- China invented ice cream, and Marco Polo is rumored to have taken the recipe (along with the recipe for noodles) back with him to Europe
- China's "one child" policy and the societal preference to have a boy has created a significant gender imbalance. (32 million more boys than girls in China)



South Korea

- South Korea has the world's highest estimated national IQ (declared by the OECD)
- EveR-1 is the world's second female android developed by scientists from South Korea.
- Koreans hide their shoes on the first night of the new year so a ghost will not take them, giving the owner bad luck
- Songdo City to be the most energy and resource-efficient city in the world



India

- India is the largest democracy in the world, the 6th largest Country in the world, and one of the most ancient civilizations.
- The world's first university was established in Takshila in 700 BC.
- India was one of the richest countries till the time of British rule in the early 17th Century.
- More than a million Indians are millionaires, yet most Indians live on less than two dollars a day.




Malaysia

- Malaysians, known as the friendliest and most hospitable people in Asia, warmly welcome international visitors
- One of the founding members of The Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN)
- The 5th Tiger (according to: The Global Guru)
- The main religion in Malaysia is Islam, followed by Buddhism, Christianity and Hinduism.


Cultural Perceptions

Collectivist and Individualist Culture




- Individualism: giving priority to one's own goals and defining one's identity in terms of personal attributes.


Washington State University

Washington State University is the public, land-grant university for the state of Washington.

→ WSU has a combined undergraduate enrollment of 21,726

The Education Abroad Office serves students on all four campuses: Pullman, Tri-Cities, Vancouver and Spokane.

- → WSU sends about 600 students abroad each year on: Faculty-led, Exchanges, Internships, and Study Abroad Programs.
- → WSU Education Abroad Office employs 6 fulltime staff: 2.5 Advisors, 1.5 Faculty-led Coordinators, 1 Director, and 1 office assistant.






Where are WSU Students Studying?




WSU Students Participation on Programs in Asia




Total Asia Program Offerings by Type at WSU




What Type of Programs in Asia are WSU Students Actually Studying on?




Number of Asia Programs Available at WSU by Destination




Actual Number of Students Studying in Asia by Destination



What Length of Time are WSU Students Studying Abroad in Asia?




Language of Instruction on Asia Programs




How Well Do WSU students know Asia?

- → Received 24 complete map quizzes.
 - → Average Score: 13
 - → Top Score: 28
 - → Low Score: 2
- → Top three most recognizable countries:
 - 1) China -24 correct
 - 2) India 23 correct
 - 3) Japan 22 correct
- → Top three least recognizable countries:
 - 1) Malaysia, Thailand, Myanmar, Butan, Tajikistan, 0 correct
 - Laos, Bangladesh, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan, – 1 correct
 - 3) Sri Lanka, Turkmenistan, 2 correct




Pacific Lutheran University (PLU)

- → PLU is a small, private, university located in Tacoma, WA
- PLU has an undergraduate enrollment of 3,590 (63% female, 37% male)
- Over 40% of PLU students study abroad, most of which are on J-Term programs.





General Student Interest in Asia




- → Sent Survey to 400 WSU, received 66 completed surveys (16.5% response rate)
 → 30% Male, 70% Female
- Sent Survey to PLU students, received 78 completed surveys
- → 100% of respondents at both PLU and WSU said that they had considered studying abroad while in College.
- → 55% of PLU students and 50% of WSU students reported they had considered studying abroad in Asia.

Q: In terms of where you would like to study abroad, please indicate which regions of the world that are most appealing to you. Pick your top three.




PLU Student Response




Q: What about these regions interest you? (Please indicate all that apply)




Q: What about these regions interest you? (Please indicate all that apply)




Asia Study Abroad: The Returnees' Experience

- •Received 45 responses.


Where did you study abroad?

What were some of the greatest challenges you faced while studying abroad in Asia?




Greatest Challenges – "Other" (selected responses)

- Financial
- Learning to navigate a new city (2)
- Different teaching style / class schedules
- University Bureaucracy
- Couldn't stay long enough / not enough time! (3)
- None / No issues at all / I did not face any challenges
 (3)

Describe your most positive experience studying abroad in Asia (open ended)

- 33 of the 45 responses mentioned the "people"
 - I got to interact and become good friends with people not only from the host country, but from all over the world.
 - I met people from all around the world. I still keep in touch with them and am very glad to have met them.
 - The people in Japan were very nice, they were always willing to help us if we needed directions or were confused about something.
 - Connecting with the family that I stayed with in China. I really became close with them and they told me that they loved me like their own son and that anytime I was in China I had a home because their house was not just theirs', they told me it was my house as well.
- 13 of the 45 responses mentioned "experiencing a new culture"
- 3 of the 45 responses mentioned the FOOD.
- A few of the responses mentioned the coursework ©

What would you tell a friend who is considering studying abroad in Asia?

- 23 of the 45 respondents said, "Do it, Go for it! Definitely go!"
- 9 of 45 said "be prepared and open minded"
 - "Be prepared for the hardest, but most fulfilling time of your life. It's a challenge but something you will never forget. If you want to learn and understand a new culture and people, go to China. It was the best experience I have ever had and hopefully more people will become interested in Asia".
 - "learn the language and hang out with the kids who know the language. I had so much fun when I explored the city with kids who knew the language".
 - "It will change the way you see the world. China especially was upside down. I've been around, but China must be the most adventurous place I've been. There are no regrets"

An adviser's influence

"When I was choosing where to go, one of my professors gave me the advice that I could always go to Europe. He said that I needed to get out of my comfort zone and go somewhere that would be more of a challenge. Going to Asia isn't just a memory; it's made me who I am. It's helped me develop passions that I didn't know I had and it's changed how I view the world, especially America"

Challenges

- Language
- Unfamiliarity
- Safety concerns
- Health & Wellness
- Support Services



Reality

- Asia is an exciting land of contrasts (ancient - ultramodern)
- There is a destination for all comfort levels
- Asian Universities offer more than Language and Culture Classes
- Language proficiency is not required
- Culture shock is likely
- Living Standards are much different
- Students must be prepared for differences



Actions Needed

- More promotion of Asia as a study destination
- Emphasis on the affordability of Asia and scholarships available
- Stress the value and relevance of learning an Asian language
- Seek out testimonials from SA students returning from Asia
- Dispel misperceptions
