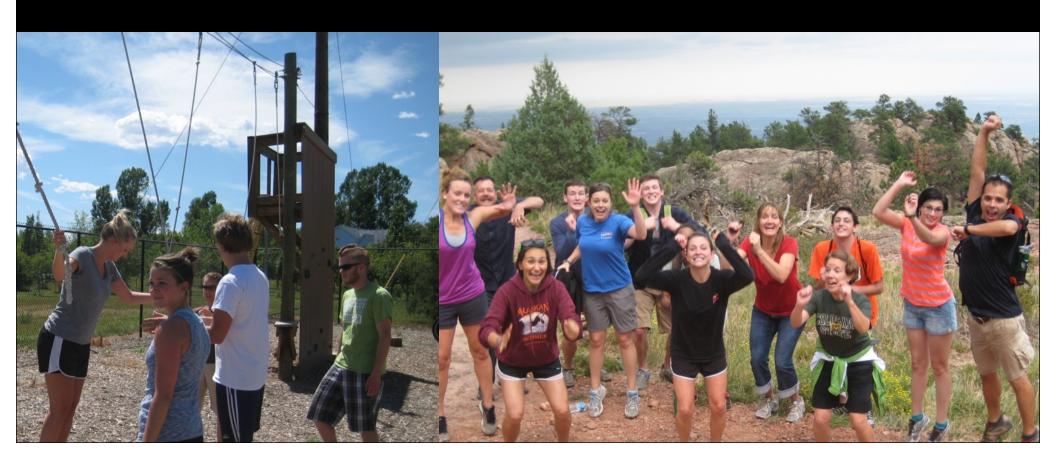

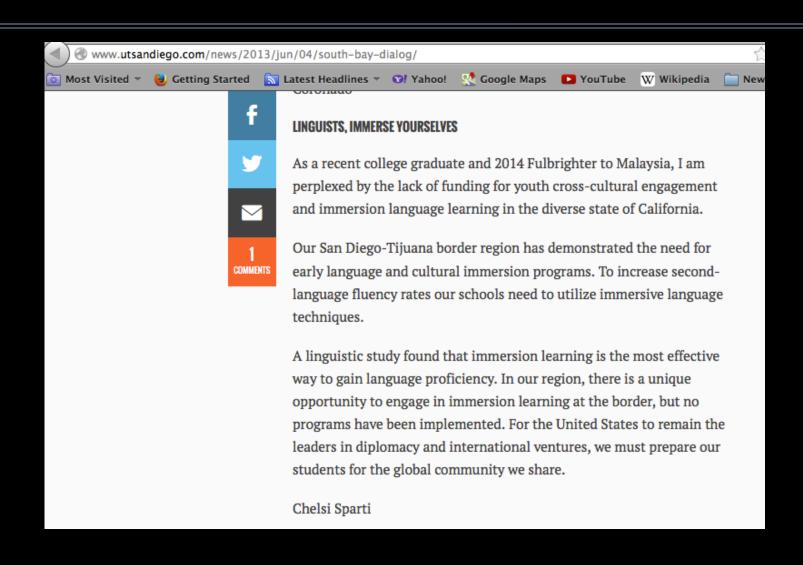

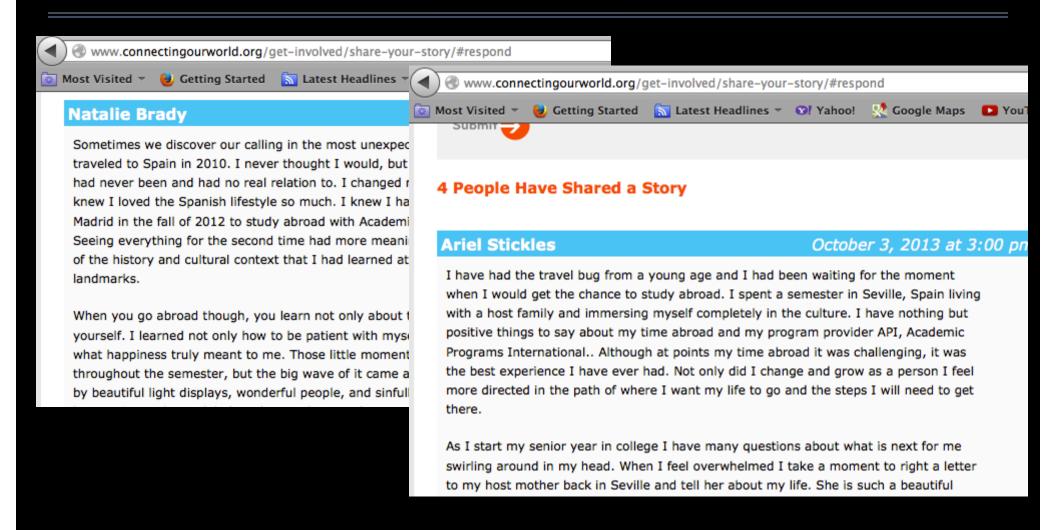
Dear Mr. Senator:

Alumni Programming as Professional Development

- Compensation should match learning objectives of the program

Lessons From Abroad, Nebraska: Saturday, September 28, 2013:

Alumni Stories: Peer Advisors to Professionals

Kayla Rivers, Colorado State University Peer Advisor Finance major / Studied abroad: Argentina Spring 2012

I returned to CSU and began working in the Education Abroad office in order to continue the love of my experience and share it with others. If there was anything I learned while studying abroad it was how through humility and a genuine willingness to learn you can form connections and have experiences you never dreamed were possible.

Professionally, working as a peer advisor has developed my public speaking skills, my knowledge of culture, geography and language. Speaking in front of classes and one-on-one with students has helped me to become a better listener, and I'd like to think, better at determining the best fit for students. My experience abroad has helped me to connect with people who come from diverse backgrounds and have different worldviews. The ability to listen and interpret new ideas with a clear and unbiased mentality is what I believe is the most important aspect of international education. The more humility and spirit-of-learning we can foster through exchange, the better our future interactions will be, socially and diplomatically. Ultimately, this revolution of breaking down the barriers of our own cultural biases will translate into a more positive future for the entire world-community.

Kristen Goulet, Colorado State University Peer Advisor Economics and Spanish double major / Studied abroad: Spain AY

As a peer adviser every day I get to work with students and communicate with them effectively. These personal interactions have greatly helped my communication skills and have forced me to not be shy in certain scenarios. I have also developed my public speaking abilities and feel comfortable talking to classes of sometimes 200+ students.

Being a peer adviser has really shown me what it means to work in a professional setting with professional expectations. Every day I work with the professional full-time staff and they constantly are helping me to develop my advising skills.

I studied abroad in Spain for a year and during my time in Europe I experienced exponential personal growth. Now I am much more independent and confident in all aspects of my life. Now as a peer adviser I am able to share my experience with other students and highlight all the benefits that they are bound to receive if they study abroad!

Grant Emory, API Peer Mentor

Studied abroad: Florence, Italy / Marketing and Advertising professional

The decision to apply for the API alumni program was more so a need than a desire. In an effort to convey that mentality best, I looked back to my original application for inspiration. I stated, "After being abroad for a period of time, one notices a sense of empowerment spurred by immersing one's self in a foreign environment. *One does not fully understand the gravity of their study abroad until they are aboard the return flight to the U.S.*" That final sentence summarizes my need best— a need to share the opportunities an international education provides. Following my return to America, I realized that my time abroad altered my goals and I needed to help others experience life abroad.

The greatest benefit [of participating in the alumni program] was helping others discover an opportunity to study abroad.

Prior to my involvement with API's alumni programs, I was content to pursue a career in Advertising, but like any great trip, there are unplanned stops along the way. I realized that a career behind a desk, will little thought given to global citizenship, would not fulfill my current life goals. This past summer, I began my path towards an international career through a marketing / brand development position in Kunming, China.

Alumni Stories: Peer Advisors to Professionals

Siobhan Neela-Stock

Studied abroad: Granada, Spain AY / International Division of the American Red Cross in D.C.

I applied [to the API Peer Mentor program] because I wanted to understand more about how study abroad had affected me and others. When I got back from studying abroad all I wanted to do was return and the program was a helpful outlet for me to understand these feelings and understand more of the study abroad profile on my campus. I learned how to effectively articulate what I gained and lessons learned from studying abroad and to share this learning with my campus. The most effective means I found to do this was through classroom presentations. I remember my first activity was extending that learning to and encouraging first year students to begin thinking about and planning their study abroad (It's never too early!).

The biggest benefit was connecting with a community (both API staff and other Peer Mentors) who were as passionate about study abroad and their experiences as I am. I also loved meeting students on my campus and sharing resources and experiences about study abroad. It was very interesting to see what goals they had for their experience and to realize that there is no one "correct" way to have a study abroad experience. Five months after graduating from undergrad and the Peer Mentor Program, I find myself talking about my study abroad experience and encouraging others to take the leap and do it themselves. Study abroad was one of the most definitive periods of my college experience and is something I truly believe everyone (no matter their major) should do.

I also really gained a lot from doing my end of year project. It focused on U.S. immigration Policy and I had the chance to interview an undocumented high school student who shared with me his experience about being undocumented and living in the U.S. I had a theoretical sense of what this was like from reading about it but had never been able to attach the research to someone I knew. The project spurred me to become more involved in the U.S. immigration debate and connected me with professionals who work in the field.

I am currently interning at an organization that has many international ties and an international basis. During my interview I talked about study abroad and how I think it could help me be successful in my internship. For example, skills such as interacting with people from different cultures, learning how to be resourceful, and persevering through challenges that seem insurmountable.

Chelsi Sparti, API Peer Mentor

Studied abroad: Seville, Spain / 2014 Fulbright Malaysia

I applied to the API Peer Mentor program because I was so adamant about advocating for a study abroad service that exceeded my needs and expectations. My time abroad shifted my thinking towards the path I was meant for in international relations. I wanted to share that passion I regained with other students, especially science majors. I was able to keep the study abroad experience alive through constant international adventures, conversation and peer mentoring.

I learned how to better communicate concisely, how to network effectively in the international education realm, more creative skills in producing resources and projects. And most of all, this experience supplemented my preparation for my Fulbright application, which was successful. Because of API, I had the support system in international friends to understand the implications of a Fulbright grant, the professionals at API to ask questions and international skills that allowed me to be well versed in all my interviews and written application.
