
Incorporating Ethnographic Pedagogy into Your Pre-Departure Sessions

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

What is Ethnography?

"Ethnography is a tool through which people...can come to know the depth of differences separating them, grasp the precise nature of these differences, and construct a public vocabulary through which they can seriously talk to one another" (Rosaldo, 1999, p. 33).

"Ethnography is about discovery, Skillful ethnography is about making some room for the creative imagination and some discipline intuition" (Shweder, 1996, p. 154).

Study of human social phenomena and communities, through means such as fieldwork. Study abrused students can use ethnography as a way to integrate into the communities they will be exposed to and engaged with.

Seasonal Calendars

- Trace seasonal variations in labor activities, income flow, and expenditure patterns
- Can include:
 - weather patterns, crops and animal productions, animal and plant diseases, human health patterns, and social obligations and events
- Useful for community members within different subgroups
- Can enhance the conversation


