Definitions

- Internationalization the process of integrating an international, intercultural, or global dimension into the purpose, functions, or delivery of post secondary education.
- Multicultural Education content integration, knowledge construction, and equity pedagogy that considers an array of cultures & determines how implicit cultural assumptions influence the individual

Multicultural Education v. Internationalization

Multicultural Education v. Internationalization

Multicultural Education v. Internationalization

- Internationalists tend to treat cultures as monolithic & typically focus on study abroad & international students
- Multicultural courses tend to look only at issues of race, gender, & so forth, as they are manifested within the U. S.
- Silos of knowledge
- Compete for same administrative support & financial & logistical resources

- •Oversee campus wide efforts to create a community that is committed to inclusion & pluralism as well as a culture of international engagement
- •Foster a campus environment that promotes integrity, responsible citizenship, & respect for diversity


- Work to elevate the University's current international initiatives & programs & develop new ones
